What's Inside the Cupid's Fall Companion? Glad you asked.


- A (partial) family tree of those wild and crazy gods of Olympus;

THE STORY OF DAPHNE AND APOLLO

What happens when you insult the God of Love'? Apollo - God of light and music and a skilled archer - finds out the hard way when he taunts Eros about his bow skills. Eros responds by firing off two arrows: a gold, love-tipped arrow at Apollo, filling him with unrelenting desire for the river nymph Daphne; and a lead arrow into Daphne, causing her to run from Apollo's hot pursuit. In his love-struck state, Apollo does not take no for an answer, chasing at Daphne's heels. It is said the two were evenly matched in the race until Eros intervened, helping Apollo catch up to Daphne. Desperate to preserve her virginity, Daphne cries out to her father, Peneus, for help. Daddy dearest solves the problem by turning his daughter into a laurel ("daphne") tree.

Bernini's gorgeous sculpture (above) depicts the agonized expression on Daphne's face as her hands turn into branches. For his part, Apollo is too smitten to back off even as his beloved takes root. This gorgeous passage from Ovid's *Metamorphoses* captures the moment best:

"Even like this he loved her and, placing his hand against the trunk, he felt her heart still quivering under the new bark. He clasped the branches as if they were parts of human arms, and kissed the wood. But even the wood shrank from his kisses."

Sigh. In the end, Apollo vows to honor her forever, wearing a laurel wreath to symbolize his promise: "Always my hair will have you, my lyres will have you, my quivers will have you, laurel tree." Using his powers of eternal youth and immortality, Apollo renders Daphne evergreen. This is why the leaves of the Bay laurel do not decay.
